MIDSUMMER NUPTIALS To be announced is a July 29 vedding, ending speculation that has swirled around the royal pair in the last several months. It heightened when they were photographed swimming together in the Red Sea, off the coast of Yemen three weeks ago.

The ceremony will be at a royal island resort in St. Thomas. where the princess was born. Guests and media from around the world will attend what an anonymous senior official from Faithminster Abbey calls 'a traditional and elegant, but not ex-cessive" event.

during childbirth in the world's poorest countries. Her Save the Mothers project has recently attracted the attention of the United Nations, which, in partnership with the World Bank, is expected to look at proposals to back an international centre headquartering the princess's work.

rights, Prince Thomas is expected to continue to use his media influence to raise awareness of Third World issues. The prince is a student of eco-

nomics, philosophy and English literature, and has become a recognized commentator on cultural trends. writing in international publications with what critics call a thoughtful style.

> ROYAL HOUSES UNITE The wedding will tie the House of Cham-

berlain with the Hohenstaufen Dynasty, which enfolds the prince's royal Mennonite Froese lineage. England's Queen Margaret and the Weimar Republic's King Guenter have both endorsed Thomas' and Dr.

Jean's courtship since they were first seen together publicly in the spring of 2000, watching Vic-toria Day fireworks at London's River Thames

SPLENDOUR IN COMMON CLOTHING
It's widely agreed the royals have the admiration of family and friends for foregoing the comforts of aristocracy. The prince and princess have pursued a variety of interests and both maintain a remarkably youthful countenance. Raquetball is among their joint pleasures. Princess Dr. Jean, who studied baby-catching at Oxford University, has a keen interest in medical ethics and has lectured extensively on the issue.

Almost a foot shorter than the prince, the attractive brunette was named by the medical journal Babes Today in 2000 as one of the 10 prettiest doctors ever. She is known to have boundless energy and a pleasant nature with people of all lots.

Thomas left royal affluence to study in Cologne and Strasbourg, before spending time in several Dominican monasteries. He enjoys the symphony,

particularly Bach, in his native Berlin Quieter than the princess, he's fond of Germany's 19th-century ro-manticists. It's said the young

blonde, blue-eyed prince epitomizes the idiom that "the little spark of the soul" (das Funklein) is the innermost
