We denounce the financialization We denounce the financialization of housing and the resulting real-ities of people being deprived of safe and dignified housing. We de-mand that city council adopt the People's Protocol immediately. Encampments come from de-ades of harmful and bad-faith pol-

cades of harmful and bad-faith pol-icies from all levels of government. Instead of fulfilling their responsi-bility to ensure safe and dignified housing for all, successive govern-ments have privatized housing and ditions. Housing isn't affordable in Hamilton through the private mareral housing advocate and Hamil-ton city council all recognize hous-ing as a fundamental human right. This means that everyone has a right to safe, secure and dignified housing. By not directing their ef-forts toward providing this housing

very human right that all levels of governments claim to uphold. The most recent mortality data released by health care providers in Hamil-ton reveals that 14 people have died in Hamilton while homeless been Dec. 1, 2022, and May 31,

By opening the right to shelter up for public debate and scorn gh so-called community co sultations on encampments, and by not prioritizing safe and dignified housing for all, the city has devaluad people's lives, while increasing the risk of harm for those of us who are unboused. And by proposing an encampment policy built on policing, the city has further criminalized those who are deprived of housing. We are living in a context where dignified, affordable housing is rarely accessible, and where people.

s rarely accessible, and where pe ole living in encampments don't save access to basic needs like bathoms, showers, garbage disposal drinking water. Ve demand change.

The ongoing harassment and attacks on encampments by some housed Hamiltonians is unaccept able, and have underst people living in encampments are facing. Reliance on policing sur-veillance and criminalization has further manginalized us and made us less safe, forcing us to choose locations to stay with fewer com-

energy is used to repeatedly find new spaces as we wait for housing Threats of violence, enforcement and displacement harm our com-munities, our relationships and impact our ability to care for our sur roundings and each other.

pact our ability to care for our sur-roundings and each other. A commitment to a human rights-based approach, which city council named as a priority, necessitates a commitment to defunding both pocommitment to detunding both po-lice and bylaw services. The police budget received a \$12-million in-crease this year, comprising almost 20 per cent of the overall city bud-get. No other sector in Hamilton has seen such large annual budget has seen such large annual budget increases despite the ungent and rapidly growing need for housing and other social services. The funds previously earmarked for enforce-ment should be put into housing first and foremost.

It is important that any pla solicies regarding encampr It is important that any plans or policies regarding encampments prioritize encampment residents' input as experties, and centre us in any decision-making. With this in mind, we have developed, with help from people who support us, an encampment protocol ("the People's Protocol"). We are calling on the City of Hamilton to implement the People's Protocol immediately to reduce the harms toward encomment. reduce the harms toward encamp ment residents and redirect its fo cus and resources into securi safe and dignified housing for all.
